Message from the President

The SCR Annual Meeting at The Drake Hotel on March 18-20, 2009 in conjunction with MBAA (Midwest Business Administration Association) promises to be the best ever under the coordination of program chair Mark Bezik of Idaho State University. Participants in record numbers have submitted critical incidents, embryo cases, papers, and panel presentations for the SCR program. Panel sessions include a discussion of the SCR case review process, a presentation on developing case studies with co-authors, a discussion of helping students to evaluate cases and write meaningful reports, and a report of the results from a survey of AACSB deans' opinions on cases as intellectual contributions.

Following our practice of the last two years, SCR will hold its Annual Business Meeting as part of a luncheon on Thursday. When registering for the conference, be sure to **sign up for the luncheon** (which is subsidized by both the MBAA and SCR). Also, if you are a primary registrant for SCR, <u>do not</u> sign up for a copy of the proceedings—you will receive a copy as a member of SCR.

The Society continued advancing several initiatives of the SCR Board over the past year. Primary among these is the rolling out of the first edition of the new *Journal of Critical Incidents (JCI)* under the dedicated editorship of Joy Benson of the University of Wisconsin—River Falls. This electronic journal provides an outlet for critical incidents presented at the annual meeting in March and subsequently revised and subjected to a blind review process similar to the manner in which the *Annual Advances in Business Cases* publishes cases from the yearly SCR Summer Case Writers Workshop. The second edition of *JCI* will publish incidents from this year's conference.

The SCR Website (www.sfcr.org) continues to be updated to be more useful to members and others seeking information about SCR and its activities. SCR cases and critical incidents written and published since 2002 in *Business Case Journal*, *Annual Advances in Business Cases*, and the new *Journal of Critical Incidents* are now available in a searchable database within a special SCR member section of the website.

Finally, thinking further ahead, the **2009 Summer Case Writers Workshop** will be held on June 25-27 on the campus of Middle Tennessee State University in Murfreesboro under the capable direction of long-time SCR member Joe Thomas. The deadline for case submissions to Joe is May 1, 2009 (contact him at 615-898-5652 or jgthomas@mtsu.edu.

The 2008-09 year has been good for SCR. We increased attendance at our meetings, successfully launched a new journal, and maintained the strong quality standards of our existing journals. I am especially grateful for the support received from the Board of Directors and other members involved in moving SCR along to greater accomplishments in case research and writing. Their involvement has made my term as President a pleasure.

Membership Dues and Information

It is important to remember to pay your dues for membership in SCR. You need to be a member of SCR to present at meetings. Your dues also include subscriptions to five SCR publications.

- 1. When you pay your dues every July you automatically get the Annual Meeting *Proceedings*, *Annual Advances in Business Cases*, *Business Case Journal*, the new electronic *Journal of Critical Incidents*, and the *SCR Newsletter*. Do not pay for the *Proceedings* again when you register for the MBAA—don't check that box.
- 2. To pay online, go to https://www.sfcr.org/members/ and follow these directions: The Pay Dues link will bring you to the payment page. At the top, it will show when your membership expires. To make a payment, select the membership type you want, 1-year or 2-year and whether you are located in the U.S., Mexico or Canada. Click the "Pay with PayPal" button. Follow the instructions provided by PayPal and then return to the SCR site. You will need to keep your payment status active to receive information from the SCR. Those who wish to pay by check can mail it to the address on the Pay Dues page; your payment status will change once payment is received.

From the Editor: Journal of Critical Incidents

Joy Benson will continue to serve as the editor of the Journal of Critical Incidents for 2009. Her thoughts on serving as editor and the process of publishing the JCI will be the topic of a presentation at the Annual meeting in March titled "A Learner's Path: Reflections of a Novice-No-Longer Editor" scheduled for presentation in the Grand Ballroom at 1:30-2:45 pm, Wednesday, March 18. Joy shares some of her thoughts with you in this Newsletter.

In his book *Six Thinking Hats* (1999), de Bono uses colored hats to reflect different perspectives that can be used when making decisions or reflecting on a process. In the reflection paper I am presenting in Chicago, I talk about the five hats (white, red, black, yellow and blue) I used as the Editor of the *Journal of Critical Incident (JCI)*. The thinking associated with each of the hats guided the process of producing the journal. The process started with a pool of 36 potential submissions, progressed to 22 actual submissions for peer review and was completed with the publication of the journal in October 2008. I gained valuable skills from my first time editor experience – skills associated with both the technical and interpersonal dynamics of publishing. This learning will be used to improve the process for the second issue.

The journal reflects de Bono's green hat – the one for creativity. The first issue of *JCI* contains 14 creative works. Authors wrote engaging incidents addressing issues of interest to academics and practitioners. Topics included financial management, small business and entrepreneurship, leadership, business and society, ethics, international, organizational culture, power, conflict, cost accounting, human resource management, marketing, and healthcare administration. The teaching notes associated with each critical incident are rich with theory, application, and learning activities. If you are interested in purchasing teaching notes they are available through SCR by contacting Roy Cook, SCR Director of Development, at Cook R@fortlewis.edu for additional information.

In addition, to creativity, the journal is about celebration. It reflects the celebration of scholarship. It reflects the celebration of using critical incidents to enhance student learning. It reflects the celebration of how critical incident scholarship contributes to faculty promotion and tenure. And, it is a celebration of our society's collegial learning community. I look forward to continuing the celebration with the 2009 issue of the *Journal of Critical Incidents*.

SCR 31st Annual Summer Case Writers Workshop

June 25-27, 2009

Middle Tennessee State University

Murfreesboro, TN 37132

The Society for Case Research 31st Annual Summer Case Writer's Workshop is planned for June 25-27, 2009 on the campus of Middle Tennessee State University (MTSU). The campus is located in Murfreesboro, TN, approximately 30 miles southeast of Nashville. Murfreesboro is a town of approximately 125,000. The area is "family friendly" with many tourist activities in the area. The area is noted for many music activities. It was also home of many Civil War battles.

Housing will be available on campus for workshop participants. There is a wide variety of motels as well as historical bed and breakfasts also available to meet individual tastes.

Workshop Purpose: The primary purpose of the workshop is to develop and improve business research, case writing, and the case reviewing skills of participants. The workshop helps aspiring case writers, beginners, and experienced case writers prepare and develop cases and teaching notes for classroom use and/or publication.

Case: Case submissions must be based on real events in an actual organization, although individuals and/or the organization may be disguised to preserve anonymity. Cases can be *decision based* (requiring the student to assume the position of a case member and make a decision about what to do) or *descriptive*, (describing a real situation and calling for an analysis of what happened.)

Submission: Cases must be submitted by May 1, 2009. Decisions regarding acceptance will be sent to authors by May 15, giving ample time for making travel arrangements to Nashville and Murfreesboro. Nashville is a major airport and flights are usually fairly inexpensive. It is also served by Interstates 24, 40, and 65.

Manuscript Guidelines: Submission requirements are available at The Society for Case Research Internet site. The Internet site provides detailed information covering formatting, permissions, referencing and the required content for teaching notes. Please visit the Internet site provided below as you prepare your cases for submission to the meeting.
